

Notes from the Pastor's Desk

I hope all are aware that we recently completed our long-awaited council/staff retreat, April 12-13! This was an important next step in our movement forward and I have been excitedly "chomping at the bit" to take the results of the *Fresh Eyes for Mission Summit* I facilitated (April 29-May 1, 2022), and "refreshed" with my

visit May 24, 2023, developed into an actual plan which will guide our mission and ministry short-term and longer-term!

The overall theme for this strategic vision is "God's Grace for Us and for Others!" The vision is two-fold; acknowledging that we want to build and strengthen our connection to God and each other within our congregation, while also reaching out to others in our regional community with God's love and grace ministering in the name of Jesus. While this will be shaping the work of our council and staff, I believe it is critically important for YOU to be aware of and be on-board with this strategic plan! There are a number of places where we will need short-term working groups to assess, evaluate and plan, so the more you are aware of the vision, the more ready you will be to step up and step in!

The Voice of Grace newsletter isn't the place for a multi-page document, but let me share the main points of the strategic vision.

I. God's Grace for Us:

- A. A Strategic Plan for building and property: what do we have, what do we need, what can be accomplished on our existing location, what are our plans for the future?
- B. Development of Youth and Family Ministry: focus on intentionality, tracking and accountability, pro-active scheduling a year out, building and growing our Sunday School and youth ministries, increase involvement of children and youth in worship.
- C. Re-establish the "connection": current pastoral visitation of all member households, encourage and support Care Team and Prayer Team, review and assess communication tools—worship folder, Voice, on-line, etc.

D. Word and Worship Emphasis:

- 1. Increase use of daily Scripture readings from NALC, support and encourage current Bible studies, build up Men of Grace Saturday studies while initiating group for younger/working men and younger/working women, continue Monday night book/bible studies with pastor.
- 2. Help members understand and appreciate Lutheran worship to grow in faith and numbers, strengthening lectionary/music connection, increase cooperation and communication between pastor, staff, musicians, Worship and Music team, Art and Environment team and congregation.
- 3. Increase worship attendance awareness and priority: worship attendance chart, worship attendance goal of 200 average in 2024!
 4. More people involved in worship—increased youth and adult choir, ushers, First Fruits offerings, crucifers, acolytes, readers, lay assisting ministers, etc.
- E. Develop plan to strengthen music ministry: assess current instruments and future needs, space for current and future choir, contract with principle leads to support and strengthen choir, evaluate current *Joyful Noise* scheduling and attendance to explore additional possibilities within the congregation and outside community.

II. God's Grace for Others:

- A. Welcoming visitors and guests, everyone a greeter—focus on connecting with guests and visitors, helping all to be more comfortable welcoming and inviting.
- **B. Outreach and visibility:** form outreach/visibility team—music and worship opportunities publicized more broadly, explore possibility of children's community choir and music academy.
- C. Evaluate feasibility of Early Childhood Education Center: what are needs in community, importance of being self-supporting, report to council by Sept. 1.
- D. Ministry outreach to community: strengthen involvement of support of WARM, Habitat for Humanity and NALC Disaster Response, support re-development of area ministerial group; participate in uptown Friday/Saturday events, continue to support particular mission opportunities through Mission Fund, as requested. You will hear more about this two-fold strategic vision, but at this point, we ask for your prayers, support and excitement for this plan to strengthen current ministry while growing our congregation in faith and in numbers! We know God is faithful! We know Jesus Christ is Lord of our congregation! And—we are praying that the Holy Spirit will stir us up, fill us with joy and energy and move us forward into that future God intends for Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church!

STUDYING SCRIPTURE IN A GROUP LEADS TO DEEPER DISCOVERY.

Tessa Morrell, production editor for ongoing curriculum at Lifeway Voices.

When we study Scripture, we encounter God's truth directly from the pages of the Spirit-inspired text. Second Timothy 3:16-17 explains that God's Word is "profitable for teaching, for rebuking, for correcting, for training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work." The Holy Spirit teaches, convicts, and encourages every believer as he or she interacts with the biblical text and discovers the wisdom of God in its pages. God's Word is living and effective, and it transforms our hearts as we read and obey what it says (Hebrews 4:12).

Scripture is a lifeline for the believer and studying it with others affirms and clarifies its truth. In a group, we benefit from not only the truth of the Word itself, but also from the exhortation and application of the Word alongside others. We learn what verses of a Scripture passage stood out to someone else and why.

A group is made up of individuals, each with unique stories and life experiences. This brings a richness to the study of the Word because we encounter different perspectives on the text. Someone might notice something in the text that we read right over and didn't see. Their perspective helps draw our attention to truth we may have overlooked in studying on our own.

Success Through Donations

Through LWR, Walaa enrolled in a livelihoods program for refugees and received all the training and supplies she needed to start a business as a beekeeper. With the money she earned, she also planted a vegetable garden to help feed her family. NALC Disaster Response Coordinator Visits Grace

On Sunday morning, April 21, Mary Bates joined Grace in the sanctuary during the Sunday School hour to update us about the many people and places that NALC Disaster Response has aided in the last year. These disasters included the Maui wildfires, Hurricane Idalia on the gulf coast of Florida, Tennessee tornadoes hit the business district of Hendersonville, the Texas wildfires in the panhandle, and the Ohio tornadoes in 11 counties in March. All of these disasters

involved people losing their homes and having to live in temporary shelters. NALC churches' members donate cash to purchase gift cards from Home Depot, Lowes, or Walmart (depending on which big box store is closest to the disaster) and items such as health kits, kitchen kits, school kits, blankets and bibles, and flood buckets (filled with materials needed to clean up flooded property) and some members have been trained and go to the sites to help clean up and rebuild structures. We have 15 warehouses scattered across the nation that we do our best to keep full, ready for the next disaster.

The brand-new volunteer training center (which is in Caldwell, Ohio, about 90 minutes from Grace) will be dedicated soon and Mary will immediately start offering classes. (see below)

Grace intends to invite its members (all ages) to gather in Caldwell next fall to help Mary with some projects! The date will be announced this summer.



On May 2, 1909, the new congregation formally organized as the Evangelical Lutheran Grace Congregation of Westerville. The first officers of the congregation selected were Ed Tedrow, elder, Peter Trapp, trustee, Milton Schott, deacon and treasurer and George Schick, Sr., secretary. Grace began

as a mission congregation of St. Paul Lutheran Church, Westerville. During the spring of 1909, members of the newly formed church requested permission of St. Paul's congregation that it form as a separate "sister" congregation to serve the growing Lutheran community of Westerville.

Pastor C. W. Pflueger (1881-1949) became the first pastor of Grace Congregation, serving both parishes from 1909 to 1916. (from the Brief History of Grace booklet)

Eighth in a series of 11 articles on the Reformation by Pr. Tom Jacobson - Southeastern Ohio Mission **District Dean**

Luther's Trial and Exile

When Martin Luther wrote the Ninety-Five Theses in 1517, that event came to represent for later generations the beginning of the era of the Reformation, which saw the rise of Lutheran and other types of Protestant churches.

Last month in this space, you read about Luther finding himself in deeper conflict as he challenged the authority of the Pope in Rome. This months article is about the fallout from that challenge. Because of Luther's refusal to recant (take back) his teachings, the Pope had issued a "bull," a document that gave Luther sixty days to recant his statements. Upon receipt of this "bull," Luther burned it along with other books of the Roman Church, such as volumes of canon law. Luther believed that many things in the exist-

ing church of Rome were getting in the way of what he believed to be the true message of the faith: Jesus Christ as Savior and our trust in that gracious promise from God.

But the story did not end there. A new emperor of the Holy Roman Empire (a conglomeration of independent kingdoms and principalities mostly covering the territory of what is

today Germany) came to the throne, the young Charles V. Charles V inherited a difficult situation. The various princes of the Holy Roman Empire were constantly seeking to expand their power and influence often at the expense of each other. From the outside, Muslim Turks were threatening to invade Europe and were approaching the city of Vienna, Austria. For Charles V, this was not the time for an internal religious conflict. He needed unity in his empire in order to defend Christian lands.

It is interesting that the threat of Muslim invasion of Europe is at least partly responsible for giving Luther a chance to live. Many of the common folk of Germany viewed Luther as a hero because he represented their dislike and distrust of Rome. Instead of storming in to take Luther by force for execution, Charles V offered Luther a chance to officially recant his writings. In doing so, he hoped to avoid a divisive conflict. He summoned Luther to an imperial diet (an assembly of princes) to be held in the city of Worms (in southern Germany). He was offered safe passage to and from the Diet of Worms. But would he meet the same fate as Jan Hus from a hundred years earlier? Hus had been summoned to the Council of Constance in 1415 with a similar promise of safe passage. But he was, in spite of that promise, burned at the stake for his views.

Luther entered the Diet of Worms on April 17, 1521. Assembled were various German princes, representatives of the Roman Church, local bishops, and Charles V himself.

On a table, Luther's prolific writings were laid out. In these writings, Luther was often critical of the Pope and of his representatives. Many of these writings had been deemed heretical (containing false teaching). Luther disagreed.

He was asked two simple questions. First, "Have you written these books?" and second, "Will you recant what you have written in these books?" Luther asked to have another day to formulate an answer, which was not expected. But his request was granted. The next day, Luther acknowledged that the books belonged to him, but he said he could not recant all of them, for even his opponents had found good in at least some of them. Furthermore, many of his concerns about the life of the church were shared by reputable people from years past. But a clear answer was demanded of Luther, and finally he responded with the famous words:

"Unless I can be instructed and convinced with evidence from the Holy Scriptures or with open, clear and distinct grounds of reasoning, then I cannot and will not recant. My conscience is captive to the Word of God. Because it is neither safe nor wise to act against conscience."

In what is possibly a later addition by another author for dramatic effect, Luther concluded with "Here I stand, I can do no other. So help me God."

One thing that is often overlooked when people discuss Luther's response and use his words as their own in contemporary conversations is that Luther was not taking a stand on

his own beliefs, but rather on the teaching of the Bible.

True to the agreement, Luther was allowed to leave the Diet of Worms in peace. But because of his refusal to recant his writings, Luther was now condemned by both the spiritual and the secular authorities of the day. Anyone who met him could kill him without threat of punishment.

On his way back to Wittenberg, the prince of Luther's territory of Saxony, the powerful and influential Frederick the Wise, dispatched a group of men who kidnapped Luther for his own safety. They brought Luther to the Wartburg Castle, where he remained for about nine months. It was during his time at the Wartburg that he completed his translation of the New Testament into German. (See page 14 - March 2024 Voice of Grace)

During his time at the Wartburg, Luther was disguised as "Knight George." He was not accustomed to the rich diet of the knights, and he also began to fall into mental and spiritual despair. He felt as though the devil was taunting him, and in defense he shouted back, "I am baptized." When assaulted by the devil, Luther's best defense was to point to God's promise given to him, which he believed had been given to him when he was baptized. For Luther, baptism was not a forgettable act that can be discarded because it happened as a child. Rather, baptism was a sure refuge of God's promise to be carried throughout life in all times of doubt and temptation.


